READING TO CHILDREN AT USIKO AFTERCARE, STELLENBOSCH

LIBRARY SERVICES

At Rhenish, we all strive to make a difference in our community. That is exactly what we did when we visited Usiko Aftercare. Many of us were worried about the time constraint and that the children would be bored and not pay attention to us at all, but we would soon realise just how wrong we were.

What stands out for me is the moment when we walked into each classroom, introducing ourselves and finding our places. The children responded in two ways - the children who ran to the front of the class to greet us enthusiastically and those who remained in the back.

There is a stigma attached to reading (one that says that recreational reading makes one a nerd), and that is what prevented many of those children from participating.

Another factor in their initial hesitation to participate is that a few of them said that they were not yet able to read. After spending some time trying to teach them, word by word, I discovered that this was not the case. The children were just scared, anxious about 'getting it wrong'. Slowly but surely, each child gained the confidence to try a new word. Before I knew it, they were reading full sentences on their own without a single child being left behind.

Towards the end of our reading session, I checked up on each librarian and they had all achieved what I had: they had found a way to engage with each and every child and unlock the confidence within them. The image I saw in each classroom was identical: a room full of excited children either reading books or paying attention as one was read to them.

Although I struggled initially to reach the children, to hold their attention, by the end of that afternoon they had clearly been bitten by the reading bug. They were captivated and enthralled by the stories and, at times, it felt that they didn't need me at all. Even the children who had initially been withdrawn and had hung back at the back of the classroom had steadily moved forward, they were engaged in the stories and they were participating with their classmates.

"Reading is the gateway for children that makes all other learning possible."

These words were spoken by Barack Obama and, on that day, we opened that gateway.
