WHY TEACHING

Education is in Mrs Megom's blood. Her mother was a teacher, her husband, David, is also a teacher (currently the Head of History at Trinity House High School in Randpark Ridge) and Mrs Megom has taught at Parktown High School for Girls since 1996.

While teaching had not been her first choice – Mrs Megom had planned on a degree in Engineering but the lack of bursary opportunities for women in Engineering made this unattainable – when she was appointed at Parktown High School for Girls she quickly discovered, to her surprise, that she loved teaching.

"I have spent the past 28 years, my whole working career, at Parktown High School for Girls and I am so grateful to the school and the people, past and present, for the opportunities and support I have received," says Mrs Megom.

"Now, it is time for a change and I am looking forward to this next chapter in my life, to what being the Principal of Rhenish Girls' High School will hold for me."
