



The Western Cape Blood Services team was extremely helpful and caring towards our Rhenish donors as they informed our donors about the blood donation process and ensured that our donors were comfortable at all times. We collected a total 19 valid units of blood, meaning that 57 lives were saved.

We truly admire and appreciate your selflessness and good hearts as it is what encourages us to continue our work and help those in need.

"I was most impressed with this new group of gr 10s as they really took everything I had taught them on board. Especially cleaning up!" commented Mrs Burger.










LEARNING CAN BE FUN
