Indeed the Cape of Storms





The weekend of 5-7 April saw one of the most vicious storms in a many years hit the Western Cape, with winds in excess of 150km/hour ripping through the heart of the Cape Winelands and surrounding areas. The damage was extensive and unfortunately Rhenish Girls' High School was not exempted from the trail of destruction, with the roof sheeting being blown off the bathrooms at the one end of the Rhenish Hall, many trees were damaged, some fences have fallen over, and we even found a grandstand in the swimming pool and the soccer goals on the mini astrotruf.

"Some of the school buildings, the Rhenish Hall, and the hostel have suffered damage to their roofs, and some of our fences, including our perimeter fence and our astroturf, swimming pool, and tennis court fences, have collapsed. With the support of our SGB and help from our dedicated staff and the Western Cape Education Department, we have managed to clear up much of the debris and mitigate all risk to our school community in order to safely open the school," said Mrs Megom.

The school is currently still assessing the total amount of the damages suffered and we will be working toward restoring these damaged buildings and infrastructure as soon as possible.



But when the going gets tough at Rhenish Girls' High School, the staff members get a broom, a rake and a chainsaw to start cleaning up. And 'oh boy' did they get going! Within a few hours of the school being closed on Monday, 8 April, teachers, administrative and ground staff all stepped up to the plate and joined hands to get the school into 'ship shape' condition. They all did such a good job that the school was actually ready to open again on 9 April; however, the WCED requested that all the schools remain closed due to transport and other factors, and we did comply with that instruction.

We would like to thank all the members of staff who took the time to assist with the cleaning and the chopping and the cutting, but mostly for showing that when things get tough, we truly bring out the best in people; the community spirit and team work was certainly evident on this day.

We would also like to say a sincere thanks to the parents who offered their assistance in removing the debris from the school grounds. We had more offers than we could use, but we appreciate every parent who offered their assistance and of course to those who provided the resources needed to ensure the grounds were cleaned, THANK YOU!




