RGHS AND HELLENIC ACADEMY CHOIR SING TOGETHER AS ONE

These lyrics, from the song Sisi Ni Moja, Swahili for "we are one", rang true on Thursday evening when Rhenish hosted the Hellenic Academy choir in a joint concert in the Rhenish Hall.

Travelling from their hometown of Harare, Zimbabwe, the choir spent nine days in South Africa. During their time here, they participated in the Cape Town Eisteddfod, where their vocal ensembles and instrumentalists fared extraordinarily well. Their 33 musicians (18 girls and 15 boys) made use of our facilities in the lead-up to the eisteddfod and, in doing so, gave anyone passing the Rhenish hall a taste of what was to come.

The concert was opened with our Rhenish choir, who set the scene by immediately transporting us into the magical world of choral singing. Singing four songs to give our visitors ample time to perform their works, our Rhenishers didn't hold back and ended their set with a new song.

You will be found from Dear Evan Hansen, with an inspiring message of hope when you feel alone; it was led by soloists Shannon Johnson and Caryn-Kaye de Bruin and featured Carmen de Wet on the drum kit.

The Hellenic Academy musicians followed with different vocal ensembles and a few soloists. Starting their set with Prayer of the Children, the incredible use of dynamic expression and precision harmonies left many in awe after only their first song. Fifteen items followed: a tuba, a flute and a viola solo, their "advanced choir", trios, duets and vocal solos. Some of these enjoyed standing ovations during the concert!

With the concert's title in mind, the choirs joined to end the evening with a mass item. A very different sounding version of the Sisi Ni Moya than that we are used to was heard as two new voice groups were added: the tenor and bass voices of the boys!

As mentioned at the end of the concert, we weren't only clapping our hands, standing up and cheering to say well done, but rather also to say thank you. Thank you to all the musicians, Rhenish and Hellenic, for leaving us with lifted spirits, sharing your talents and hard work, and taking us on a two hour memorable musical journey.

But what makes this Olympiad different from the others? According to the HOZA website, it is an online Olympiad that started in 2022, and [HOZA] inspires learners by stimulating their interest in History and tests their History knowledge in a fun way. Learners have the opportunity to receive recognition for their achievements, and it is a learning opportunity as we adhere to the learning from assessment principle."

This year, 866 high school learners from private and public schools participated in the online Olympiad.


Two of our learners received excellent results:

Blanket Assembly - Bless a Baby









- Time will be arranged by teachers.


